Practice Update:

Aston Hearing - Building Works & Other Developments In Progress

As we enter November we are pushing ahead with numerous projects to enable us to be able to cope well with more appointments in 2022. BSL, Strictly and dancing with deafness

In the news this month we celebrate the continued success of deaf actress Rose Ayling-Ellis on Strictly Come Dancing and witness the surge in searches for BSL courses. The British Sign Language (BSL) Courses website reported a 2,844% increase in sign-ups for their free trial programmes after the show.

Even if you are not a Strictly fan, you may have seen the headlines and footage from her performances. She has captivated the hearts of the nation as she learns her dance moves by feeling vibrations and counting with the support of a BSL translator to communicate with her partner Giovanni. As Strictly's first ever deaf contestant she is a fantastic ambassador for BSL and has helped increase awareness about deafness and deaf issues.

In a recent episode of the BBC competition, the couple danced a Viennese Waltz that saw them signing to each other at the start of the performance. Sign language became part of the choreography and added to the emotion of the dance. In an interview after the show Rose said –

"I just love to show my language and to incorporate it into the dance, I think it's very special for me." She praised her professional partner, Giovanni for coming up with the idea and they were awarded a very high scoring 37 points for their dance.

They achieved a perfect score of 40 points on the Halloween episode where they danced a tango that was faultless. Google searches for sign language have since increased by 488% as more people express an interest in learning BSL. In the UK around 145,000 people use BSL as their primary language, 20,000 of these being children.

The actress has urged people to look for BSL courses taught by deaf tutors as the best way to learn the language and to support the Deaf community. Courses are available locally through Adult Learning Centres and a basic understanding of signing can be a useful tool to assist those living with hearing loss.

Meet the Audiologists - Hollie Wicks

We are delighted to welcome Hollie Wicks to our team of audiologists. Hollie has been a client of Aston Hearing for a long time, and she brings her own experience of hearing loss to her work, helping countless other people to hear better.

Hollie's hearing story started in childhood when she found it difficult to hear the TV and would often argue with her brothers about the volume control. She was diagnosed with hearing loss and given an NHS aid for one ear. Whilst this helped initially, it was not enough to meet the challenging demands of social and college life. Hollie went to her GP who referred her to Duncan at Aston Hearing. Hollie was given a new, discrete hearing aid and she noticed a marked improvement immediately.



This new tech was tested immediately with her college parent's evening and driving lessons. Hollie noticed a huge improvement in both situations and describes it as "a light bulb moment – I could even hear people behind me" It gave her the confidence she needed to carry on studying at Sixth Form College and from here, she went on to study journalism at Bucks University.

Hollie later started to notice a further deterioration in her hearing and was advised to try two hearing aids instead of just one. This was a critical point in her career as she had to accept a further hearing loss and that she needed the second aid, but with support from Aston Hearing and Unitron's smallest state-of -the -art hearing aid she adjusted very quickly. She later gave a talk on her hearing journey to a large audience of hearing care professionals at the Unitron Conference.

Preferring not to have a desk job, Hollie worked for a while at Waitrose and then later became a Co-ordinator for Hidden Hearing. While she was there, she trained to become an Audiologist and qualified in 2019. She enjoys working as part of the AHS team and brings an understanding of life with hearing loss to her practice.

ONE THOUSAND MEN ARE WALKING


One thousand men are walking
